Food safety and quality management systems have been undergoing rapid changes during the last two decades to address various emerging problems. From a system, where responsibility was mainly with public institutions that used to perform end product testing and rejection of unsafe products, we have moved towards a food chain approach, where preventive measures are taken at all stages from primary production to final consumption and the responsibility is shared by all the actors in different segments of the supply chain. The role of food safety inspection has changed from end product testing to verification of application of GHP and HACCP. Concerns regarding sustainability of seafood supplies, environmental impacts of fisheries and aguaculture and increasing role of supermarkets, large retailers and multinational restaurant chains in import and distribution of seafood products, have led to several non-regulatory requirements in fish trade. Though EU, USA and Japan continue to be major markets for seafood, China and Russia are becoming major importers of seafood and domestic markets in countries like Brazil and India have been showing phenomenal growth and competing with export market. Fish Inspection and Certification Agencies are facing a challenge of meeting the requirements of these new emerging markets.
